News from the desk of the Principal, Jeanene Sampson:

Welcome to our new 6th graders, Class of 2021!

Middle school students have individual unique academic, social and emotional needs. It is North Middle's mission to **empower** students to achieve academic success as well as grow socially and emotionally in a safe environment. We are dedicated to assisting each student's transition from elementary to middle school and to preparing our students to be successful in high school and beyond. North Middle is one more stepping stone in your family's "journey of education". Our ultimate goal is to provide guidance to each student working toward a common goal of success beyond high school.

This time of year brings with it <u>so much excitement</u> for each of you to transition into middle school. Each year it's a pleasure to welcome a new group of 6th graders.

When will my student and I get to meet the new teachers in 6th grade ~

Patriot Camp is a day camp when we bring classrooms from each of the feeder schools together in small groups to meet the 6th grade teachers, tour NM, play some games with our current NM students and meet new students from other incoming 5th grade classrooms. A post card will be coming home soon with your 5th grade student. We will also host an open house in August for just the 6th graders. At this event you will have the opportunity to get your student's schedule, locker assignment, meet the teachers and tour the building.

What will my student's schedule look like for next year ~

The NM building itself appears to be very large and intimidating. I am going to do the best I can to explain how your students day will "flow" and eliminate many of those concerns. Morning recess time for all 6th graders is in a separate location from the 7th and 8th graders. Throughout the day your 6th grade student will primarily be in their "6th grade house or POD". The 6th grade POD is located upstairs toward the back of the building. Students will flow between all of their core classes within their team of teachers in the POD.

Each 6th grader will be assigned to a "team" and depending on his/her team your student will have the same teachers they will see for all of their core classes. Each team has a math, science, English and reading teacher that are JUST for your student's team. The only time your student will come out of the POD will be for lunch, and two periods of exploratory classes (P.E., choir, band, art, etc.). When they come out for these classes they pass in their own separate hallways. The only time they pass with the other grade levels is when the enter or leave the building.

Many families appreciated hearing what I just told you because they pull up in front of the building to drop their student off and what they see is a large building thinking all grade levels intermix all day and that is not the case. We are so fortunate to have three separate "houses" or "PODS" in our building so you basically have three separate middle schools under one roof.

What does the scheduling process look like for my 6th grader ~

Truly your student does not have a lot of options in their schedule as a 6th grader. NM has an 8 period day and 5 of their periods are reading, math, English, science and social studies. Each 6th grader must take technology and P.E. (which is one period) and then lunch - that takes away two periods. They are left with one open period, which is exploratory, unless they are in TAG, orchestra, band and/or choir, or intervention reading/math. Your son's or daughter's 5th grade teachers play a significant role in selecting their schedule and we truly appreciate that. You also each received a copy, of the courses they are signed up to take, at your 5th grade conferences.

2014-2015 Bussing

The Sioux City Explorers will offer their attendance incentive again this school year. Any student that missed less than five days of school for the entire school year receives a ticket that may be redeemed for one free student ticket and one free adult ticket to the June 2 or June 3 game. In order to get certificates distributed before school ends, April 30 is the cutoff date for attendance.



Middle school 'walk zone' is less than 2 miles. High school 'walk zone' is less than 3 miles. Any 8th grade students who will no longer qualify for bussing in High School will receive a letter in the mail. We offer paid bussing if space is available at \$28.00 round trip, \$14 one way on an existing route and bus stop. All **paid** students <u>MUST REAPPLY</u> for bussing every year by completing an application and marking the appropriate box requesting paid bussing. <u>Applications will now to be processed</u> in the summer for the next school year. _Please complete an application ASAP and bring it to school to be forwarded to transportation for processing this summer for the 2014-2015 school year.

Important Immunization Requirement for Middle School

The State of Iowa now requires a **TDAP** vaccination for all students entering 7th grade. Tdap is a booster vaccine for older children, adolescents, and adults. It safely protects against 3 dangerous diseases: tetanus, diphtheria, and whooping cough (also called pertussis).

This requirement will help protect your child and others in school and the community from whooping cough. In 2012, whooping cough was widespread in the United States and in Iowa with approximately 417% more persons with pertussis disease compared to the average of the past 5 years. (Iowa Department of Public Health)

All 7th grade students will need to provide proof of receiving the Tdap vaccination before enrolling for school in August 2014. Many students may have already received this immunization. Please be sure to provide the school with an updated immunization record if your student has already received the immunization or if they receive it during this school year. Records may be faxed to North Middle at 277-5941.

Medication: End of School Year

If your child has medication at school, the medication will be sent home with your child on the last day of school. Please check with your child for the medication.


6TH GRADE READING

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Wellness Tip: Be An Active Family

Physical activity is important for children and adults of all ages. Being active as a family can benefit everyone. Adults need 2 1/2 hours a week of physical activity and children need 60 minutes a day.
